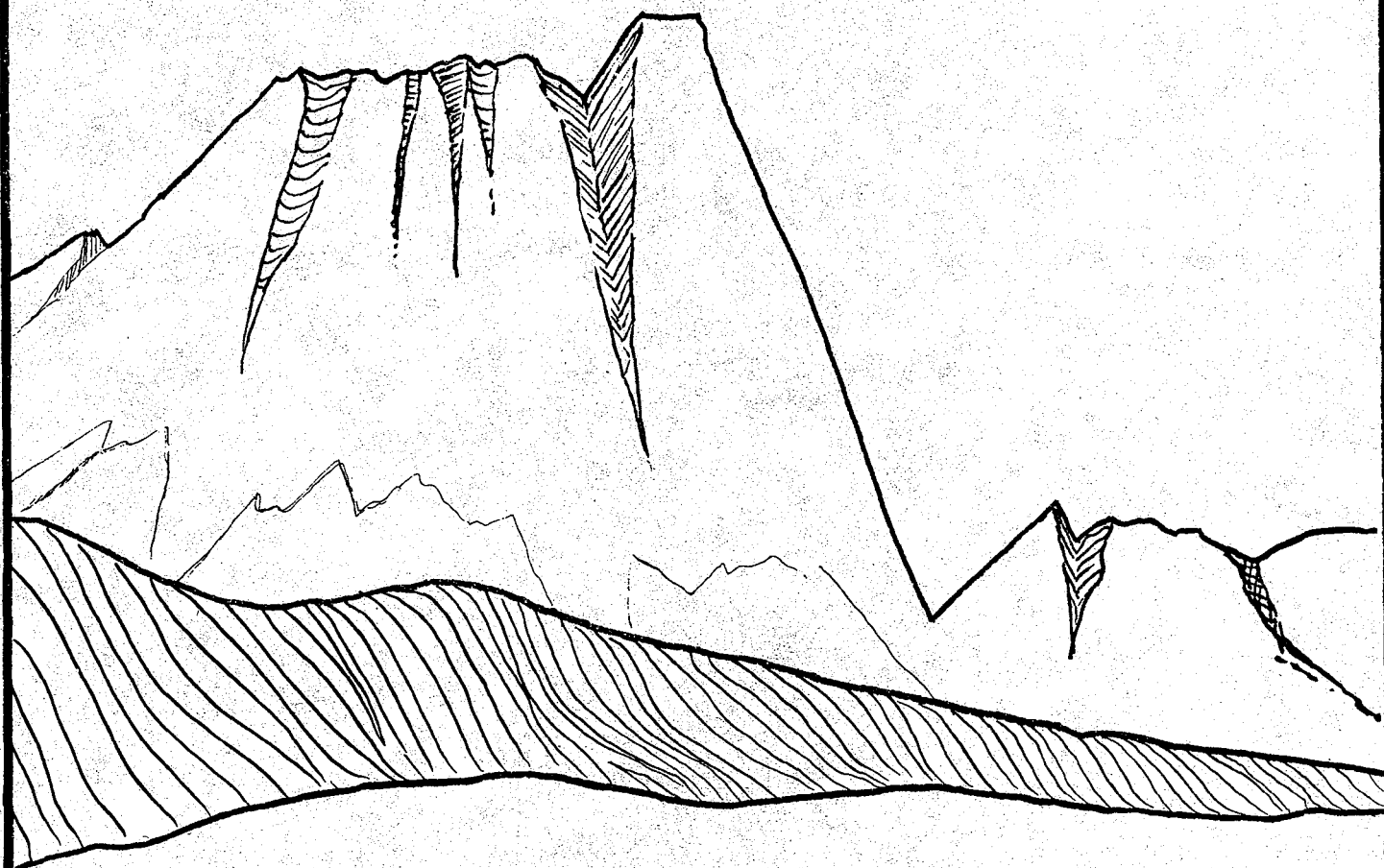

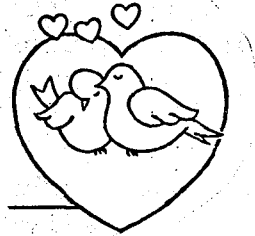

Lilly Kathryn FURLONG was born in Chester Montana November 22nd, 1922. She was the 6th of ten children and the first daughter born to Ina Marie Keith and Edward R. Furlong. Lilly received her formal education in the Chester community, graduating from C.H.S. in 1941. She married Howard Glenn Eveland on February 17th, 1942 in Helena. While Howard completed his military training, Lilly made her home in Chester and worked at the telephone office. In 1949 she began working at the Liberty County Library and also worked part-time at the Clerk-&-Recorder's Office. Lilly served as Liberty County Librarian for 40 years, retiring in December of 1989. She suffered from cancer these past few years which required numerous hospitalizations and treatments. Two weeks ago she went to California to be with her sister, Ina. While there she entered a hospital at Whittier and died on the afternoon of Tuesday, Feb. 5th. She was 66 years old.

Lilly was a lifelong member of the Chester Methodist Church. Because her infant baptism records were lost, she was rebaptized in the new Methodist Church several years ago. Lilly was also a charter member of the Chester V.F.W. Auxiliary and had been a member of the Royal Neighbors of America dating back to 1939. She also held membership in the Montana Library Association from 1951-1990. In addition, she helped form the Broken Mountain Genealogical Society and was a supporter patron of the Chester Garden Club. In 1976 Lilly designed the Liberty County flag for the bicentennial; Maxine Ward did the needle-work in that original flag, which is

still on display at the county library. In more recent years Lilly enjoyed her involvement with the Milk River Good Sam Club and she always looked forward to attending the annual Sweetgrass Hills Family Camp.

Lilly had numerous hobbies. She loved to read, and always encouraged the younger people to read. She personally took several telecom continuing education courses through the library system. Lilly enjoyed gardening, flowers and houseplants (in fact, a lot of the green plants at the library were originally started by Lilly). When her kids were young, she did a lot of sewing and mending. She enjoyed working crossword puzzles and playing 'scrabble'. She was a good cook, and her family has fond memories of her wonderful breads and her delicious cornbread-&-beans. Lilly was always generous to her family and friends, and she enjoyed her many contacts with her church family.

Lilly had cancer that ravished her physical body, but it couldn't destroy her undying faith. She was given a poem that she shared with her family and friends. The poem is entitled "What Cancer Can't Do. by author unknown:

Cancer is so limited...  
It cannot cripple love,  
It cannot shatter hope.  
It cannot corrode faith,  
It cannot eat away peace,  
It cannot destroy confidence,  
It cannot kill friendship,  
It cannot shut out memories,  
It cannot silence courage,  
It cannot invade the soul,  
It cannot reduce eternal life,  
It cannot quench the Spirit,  
It cannot lessen the power of  
the resurrection.

Lilly's survivors include her four children, Aline & Gale Christenot of Virginia Beach, Virginia, Neal & Pat Eveland of Chester, Ardes

& Charles Connel of Alamogordo, New Mexico, and Ardell & Philip Kruitoff of Billings; eight grandchildren, including Corene, Sabra, Keith, Kris, Kevin, Robert, Kathryn and Karalyn; her former husband, Howard of Chester; two sister, Ina Belle("Kitty") Foreman of LaHabra, California, and Alice Morrison of Chester; four brothers Russell("Bing") Furlong of Chester, Phillip Furlong of Denver, Colorado, Warren("Irish") Furlong of Spokane, Washington, and Noel Furlong of Kalispell; three aunts; and numerous nephews and neices. She was preceded in death by her parents and three brothers (Edmond, Miles and David Furlong).

Funeral services were held at the Chester United Methodist Church on Monday, February 11th, at 11:00 a.m. Reverend Charles Nowlen and Reverend Charles Hanson officiated. The congregation sang "Be Thou My Vision", accompanied by Gail Cicon. One of Lilly's favorite songs "Whispering Hope" was performed by the vocal duet of Rudy Cicon and Dennis Kenfield. A male quartette consisting of Garth Good, Orville Solum, Mark Zerbe and John Hofer sang "In the Sweet Bye and Bye", accompanied by Edith Hodges. Old friends and classmates serving as pallbearers and ushers included Aden Ward, Delmar Wolfe, Bob Wigen, Harley Rudolph, Cliff Lybeck, Don Marble, Darby O'Brien, Arlo Skari, Jennings Mattson, Joe Gagnon, Max Brown, Narciss Gagnon, Neil Shepherd. Friends from the RNA and VFW Auxiliary served as honorary bearers. Following graveside services at the Chester Cemetery, a luncheon was held at the church. Funeral arrangement were by Rockman Chapel ,Chester.

Lilly Eveland passed away February 6th, 1991.

## POST OFFICES

### OR HOW COME IT'S CALLED WHITLASH

Contrary to what most people have believed, Whitlash was the first post office established in the Sweet Grass Hills. It was founded by the Post Office Department in December 1892, and George B. Bourne was appointed the first post master. The exact location is uncertain. It was possibly nearer the present site of Hill or wherever Bourne was living at the time he served as postmaster.

Three years later the Gold Butte Post Office was created February 9, 1895 with Peter Hughes appointed the first postmaster.

Hill Post Office was founded six years later, August 6, 1898 and James E. Hamilton was first appointed postmaster.

West Butte was set up May 24, 1901 and Mary Knobel was postmistress. The name of this office was changed to McDermott, October 1, 1925.

There were post offices at Laird and Kippen. The one at Laird was at the Frank Laird ranch on the east side of the Hills.

Kippen was southwest of Middle or Gold Butte. When these offices were officially opened and closed has not been obtained.

The Whitlash post office was the "Roamer" since it moved with the appointment of each successive postmaster.

The second postmaster was Maurice Price whom most of the old timers remember and have associated as the first postmaster. He was commissioned on October 24, 1893 and the office was located at his log cabin north of what is know as the Company Ranch operated today by Jake Hofer.

The third location was at Hiram Smiths, the Don Meech ranch of today. The fourth was at Michael Fitzpatrick's at the alkali lake west of Whitlash. In 1905 it moved to what is known as "Old Whitlash" located on Half Breed Creek about 3/4 mile west of the present Whitlash. It remained there about nine years until 1914 when it moved to the present location.

Likewise there are several stories about how "Whitlash" was named.

One, that a number of men, congregated in a small shack for the purpose of selecting a name for their post office and sending it in to the Postal Department. The event called for celebrating and the light was a dim, smokey lantern. The name "Whiplash" was selected. The letter was written and sent. When the material was returned it was spelled "Whit lash", perhaps the writing wasn't too clear.

Another version has it was named by George B. Bourne, or a miner named Whitlach and here again the postal department couldn't read western writing and the name came back "Whitlash."

Prior to these offices mail was gotten at Fort Benton by those living here and some got their mail from Shelby.

# FRED MUNDY'S FLOUR MILL

AT GILDFORD

When I was a kid I thought Gildford was the most exciting town in the world. It was my favorite of all the Hi-Line towns because it had what I considered to be the three most important things in the world--a reservoir where a fellow could go swimming if he took the notion, a plant where they made grasshopper poison and Fred Mundy's flour mill.

But now that I'm older the reservoir and the grasshopper plant have faded from my memory. But G. Fred Mundy's flour mill lives on, not because it still holds the fascinations of my childhood but because I now realize how important it was to the economy of the area it served. G. Fred Mundy and his mill kept a lot of families from starving out during the hungry, dry days of the depression.

In the lean years when a 40-bushel load of wheat brought less than \$15 it was hardly worth hauling to town. But that same load of wheat would buy a lot at Mundy's flour mill. It would bring enough "Golden Grain flour" to last for several months; it brought feed to hundreds of cattle and hogs which were starving to death on dried Russian thistles. And many a morning it brought breakfast cereal to our table. (Fred Mundy's breakfast cereal wasn't shot from guns or anything like that, and the bags didn't offer "free gifts" which you could send away and get for 50 cents. But it tasted just as good as does the stuff we eat today--and it probably had more vitamins too!)

At G. Fred Mundy's flour mill the farmer received value in kind for his wheat--value you could set on the table and eat--not a few deflated dollars that could hardly pay for the wear and tear on a team of horses in hauling it to the elevator for cash sale.

The story of Fred Mundy and his flour mill might well serve as an inspiration to the younger generation of Hi-Line people.

G. Fred Mundy arrived in Gildford in 1911 and filed on a homestead in the chocolate loam basin north to town (21-35-11). The town of Gildford was still in its infancy in this year, having only recently stolen the thunder from old Dayton siding a mile west, which at one time threatened to push Gildford off the map.

By the year 1914, Fred Mundy knew that this chocolate loam basin of Northern Montana was destined to become a great wheat empire. He had seen the cattle ranches along Sage creek give way to dryland farming. He had seen his first 20-bushel per acre wheat crop in this country of little rain.

In the early months of 1915 he drew up plans for a flour mill and construction began as soon as the ground thawed out in the spring. A. J. Guenther completed excavation work by the middle of April and P. Westland, the general contractor, moved in with his crew and began the actual construction of the mill on April 16.

On April 21 Mr. Mundy took a few days off from his farming and mill building to get married. Miss Alice Berg, who had filed on a neighboring homestead to her future husband, became his bride in the M.E. parsonage in Havre. On May 10 they moved into a new cottage near the mill site. John Dolezal constructed the cottage for Mr. Mundy.

Work on the mill continued at a brisk pace during the long, hot days of summer. Mundy had already announced in J. T. Casey' "Gildford Tribune" that the mill would be ready to accommodate farmers by the time harvest rolled around.

And the new custom flour mill opened right on schedule. The first load of wheat drove through the mill doors the day after Labor day, 1915. The wheat was milled into flour and G. Fred Mundy was in business--a business that was to span over a third of a century. The doors on the Mundy mill were closed in 1951.

The mill operated at its full 40 barrels per day capacity for many, many years. "Golden Grain" flour, milled from the highest protein wheat in the world, soon became the top selling flour in grocery stores up and down the Hi-Line. It found its way into nearly every farm home in the area--milled from the wheat the farmers hauled to the mill. And at one time the big white bags of "Golden Grain" flour were shipped out of state to large wholesalers for retail distribution.

As new methods were developed, the mill continued to expand and improve its products. New services were added to the mill--the manufacture of breakfast cereals, feed grinding, and grain cleaning and treating.

The mill became a landmark in Gildford. It was to be the first and last industry the lower Hi-Line area could ever claim. When it closed its doors in 1951, it marked the end of the Hi-Line as I knew it as a child. It began a new area--an era when tractors were to outnumber people, an era when the small towns began to fade away.

But when the old flour mill is forgotten, its founder will live on. Fred Mundy has been much more than just a mill owner and a farmer during his forty five years on the Hi-Line. In the early days he was the spirit of a young and robust country. In the years between then and now he was a builder--a builder in his community, a builder of schools and churches, a champion of the country he helped to develop.

He has served the Hi-Line well--his community, his country and his state. He served in the

state legislature as State Senator from Hill county.

## HINGHAM WAS EARLY DAY MEDICAL CENTER

Dr. Arthur A. Husser, who was one day to become the most beloved of Northern Montana's country doctors, came to Hingham in 1912 after persistent persuasion by the Hingham Commercial club. The civic group pledged him "unlimited assistance and cooperation in the construction of a community hospital."

Dr. and Mrs. Husser began their work in the community by opening a drug store in the rear of the Becwar store. The doctor, first by horse and buggy and later by an early vintage automobile, made frequent trips to far-flung rural areas to treat the aches and pains of homesteaders and their families.

In the fall of 1913, Dr. Husser completed construction of his hospital, the Hingham Sanitarium. The drug store was moved from the Becwar store to the hospital and was rechristened the Hingham drug company.

The new Hingham hospital was adequately staffed by Mrs. Husser, Louise Sauter and Florence Kiest, registered nurses. Their aides were Isabelle Budge, Jeanette Carmody, Agnes Chvilicek and Sidney Dalrymple.

The hospital and drug store were operated until 1919 when the building was destroyed by fire.

R. J. Howe was the first veterinary surgeon in Hingham.

On August 8, 1913, the Hingham Commercial company "-- laid in a stock of undertaking supplies to serve the needs of Hingham and Hi-Line residents."

His death comes as a severe shock to his many friends. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved family in their loss of a devoted husband and father.

While not unexpected. News that Roy NORRIS had given up his brave struggle for life and crossed the Great Divide, was none the less sad and cast a gloom throughout the community in which he was a universal favorite. After the hailing out of their big crop ,Roy and his brother Art went to the Basin harvest fields, and the two months strenuous life with the attendant exposure and hardships incident to threshing, no doubt hastened his end, as he was confined to his home on his reture where he remained to the end.

Mr. NORRIS was born in Chicago. He came west eleven years ago, landing in Williston, N. Dak., where the parents located on a homestead, which they worked for five years before coming to Montana, where the brothers took up homesteads in 1909, which they have since worked.

Roy leaves to mourn his loss ,his mother , father , and brother Arthemus, a sister , Nellie NORRETTA having gone before, and a host of friends mourn with the bereaved relatives and extend to them their heartfelt sympathy in the hour of trail.

## **MY LIFE AS A HOMESTEADER**

**BY MRS. ETTA ARMSTRONG**

TAKEN FROM "TRAILS, TRIALS AND TRIBUTES" COMPILED BY THE EGLY COUNTRY CLUB-1958

In December of 1912 I journeyed from Chicago, Illinois to Great Falls to file on my homestead -N1/2 of Section 22 Township 28 N. Range 6 East, and doubled back to Chicago -- the trip consuming a week. I lost eight pounds on the trip. It was a part of my vacation, as I was teaching the 7th grade for the fourth year, in Rossville, Illinois -- 101 miles south of Chicago.

In June -- in fact, June 29th, 1913 -- I established residence on my future home for ten years. I helped to saw every board and timber on my 12' x 18' shack and to shingle at least eight rows on each side of the roof. I spent my first winter on the Marias River at the former WARREN place (now known as the THISSELLE place) where I taught an 8th grade boy in exchange for my room and board and little else.

On the first day of March, I started to teach the first term of school in the newly created district in Chouteau County, with May FLANAGAN as County Superintendent. The school was held in a 11' x 13' shack on the Dave RAUSER homestead, across the road from the W. H. EARL residence. The school site was dubbed "Sloppy Junction" by one of the patrons. "Sloppy" being the nickname for Dave RAUSER, a man from the state of Washington, who came to homestead with the EARLS, LEEPERS, STAFFORDS, and many others from that state. After completing my nine months term of school I accepted a position up north, to teach the winter term at the ERICKSON School.

That spring I was married to Thomas ARMSTRONG and we remained on my homestead through thick and thin (mostly thin) for the next eight years. To us three children were born, the older two passing away as babies.

During the term I taught at the Low School (M. Isaac LOW deeded an acre to the district in 1915 or 1916). I walked or rode to school, sometimes using an umbrella to scare a vicious bull away right on my own land, until I finally earned enough to have it fenced.



In order to accommodate as many pupils as possible only four months of school were held at "Sloppy Junction" where I had 15 pupils and the other five months were held in another of Mr. EARL'S buildings four miles northeast of my homestead on the BLACKBURN place. This necessitated my using a horse for transportation instead of walking. There I had almost a turn-over of pupils --- those from the eastern part of the district attending and those from the southern part, not being able to walk so far. Those I had in school were of the neighbors LOW, EARL, CRAWFORD, LUDWIG, PETTAPIECE, HAGEN, QUARLES, McDONALD, BROUILLARD CANFIELD, SKIERKE, LORD(from west of Dugout Coulee); and later on ROMAIN, KAUFMANN, WAREHIME; and later still, BAUMMGARTNER'S who bought a relinquishment just north of me.

Other old time residents were the WELLS, STAFFORDS, Gene WEST, and McISAAC. CRAWFORDS in the immediate Marias Post Office (Mrs. SKIERKA being postmaster) area. And possibly others who did remain long enough to make a lasting impression on my mind. In 1919 Liberty County was formed and I was living in a new county.

In 1923 Mr. ARMSTRONG and I were completely eaten out with grasshoppers so we said "Quits" after ten years of frustration, but many happy days, too; and we went to Chicago to live. I was the more homesick of the two, so in the spring of 1924 we returned to sort of run Mr. James TOWNSEND'S cattle and hay ranch for him, as he was getting up in years. in 1925 a baby boy was born to us while we were on the Townsend ranch. We stayed on it and the newly organized Marias Sheep Company -- which took over in 1928 -- for almost 16 years, when we purchased the W. F. QUERY place 12 miles west from our original homestead on Basin Coulee. We remained on the place until Mr. ARMSTRONG'S death in November 1944. I managed as best I could until our son, Alan, came home from overseas, on navy duty, in spring of 1945. Then in 1946 I turned the place over to our son, James, who with his wife, Violet, are living on the place, along with other land they acquired themselves.

I am now living in Chester, our County seat, which was a "boom town" during the creation of Tiber Dam and which is yet a pretty lively place at this date ,March 4, 1958.
