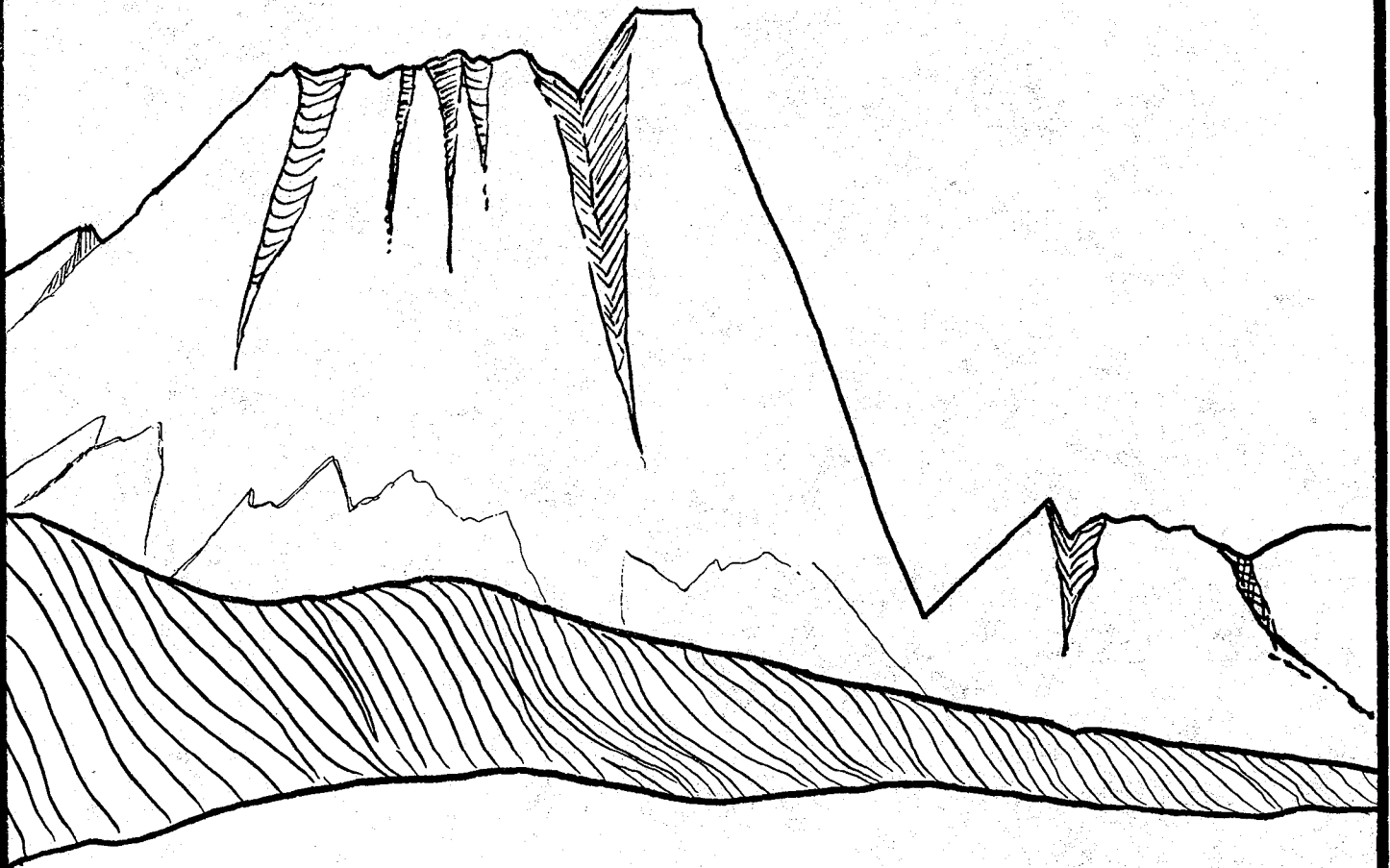

WALDEN FAMILY
LETTER AND NOTES

The following material was sent to us by Norman and Kae Walden of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, Members of Broken Mountains Genealogical Society. This material was given to them by their relatives David and Betty Kookan, of Battle Ground, Washington.

It is with their permission that this material is being published.

John Walden was a son of Nathan Walden and a brother to Claude and Roy Walden of Waldens' Hardware in Chester, Montana.

LETTER FROM MARY ANN WALDEN TO HER SON PAUL WALDEN

CHESTER, MONTANA DEC. 3, 1935

Very dear son,

I got your letter yesterday A.M. and was very glad to hear you are all well. Also glad to hear that Genevieve and new son are getting along so nicely. We are all swell here only Claude and Idella have bad colds. Idella missed school yesterday and C. had a cold & cough for about two weeks but has been able to get down to store in the afternoons the last week. There has been an epidemic of colds and coughs here for about six weeks and they have a tendency to go into pneumonia. In fact there has been three deaths from pneumonia here and several cases of it in town now so it stands one to be very careful when they get a cold. I have been so lame with one of my knees for about two months could hardly walk. Had to get a cane but it is better last two weeks so I can hobble around again.

We have a high school boy (18 yrs old) staying with us helping for his board and lodging and he washes dishes and between us we manage to cook what we eat.

They got the high school building at the end of this street so that they moved into it this week and now have all the grades in the old high school on the hill. There are a few over a hundred high (school) students here now.

The crops here this year were about an average for this country some quite good and others hardly worth harvesting but they got a good price for wheat and there was quite a lot of sheep and cattle shipped out at a good price so the farmers generally are in better fix than for several years. Roy still has his sheep. Had about 2000 but sold off some old ones and weaker and only about 1200 left. He is wintering them on the old Otto Sheppard

place. He has a big lot of feed and sheds so is well fixed to winter them. Henry Heinbiger is herding them this winter. Claude and I made a trip to Oregon in the car the first of Oct. was gone three weeks. We went down on east side of the cascade and crossed the McKinsey pass coming out @ Springfield and came home by Portland crossing the Columbia highway and by Pendleton and Walla Walla and crossed the Rockies by the Boseman route and thur Helena. Helena sure showed the effects of the earthquake several buildings almost totally shaken down and others badly cracked. This shock happened while we were in Oregon. They said they felt it very plain here and they are still having light shocks in the Helena District. The last I heard there were something over 1000 tremors. Edna has been keeping the books for over a year. She just came down and says Idella is better but not able to go to school. Gus Schultz has moved into his store where Wright was and is running a grocery there and rented his house where he lived when you were here. I just heard the woman who he rented to died of pneumonia last night. I knew they had sent to Havre for an oxygen tank for her yesterday but couldn't save her. Her husband works on the railway and she leaves a family of children.

John was feeling fine for him while we were there but the next week after we left he took another severe spell of that colitis and was very sick for several days. The moisture all but left his system and they had to bring nurse and doctor out and pump liquid into his veins. It had been over a week since I heard from him but Pearl wrote he was up on foot again. Bob is in Arizona working on some kind of government job keeping books.

Johns are still keeping students has 12 when we were there. Elita is still at Camas Wash. is substituting for teacher in school there. Her husband is still in paper mills there.

Martha Wiseman is living with Mary near Hepner in eastern Ore. Claude and I stopped and saw them. Ione is their P. O. Well it's almost time to get dinner so I will close hoping to hear from you soon.

Monday, Oct 11, 1987

Dear Norman and Kae,

As you know, we came home from our great visit with you in Calgary, with two immediate goals. One was to put together everything we could about the Walden Bros. Hardware Store in Montegue, Montana. That has been accomplished and sent to you.

The second goal was to try to determine the first name of Sarah Jane Lemmon Walden's father-in-law, who was always referred to as "Father Walden", and thought to be buried in Stipp Cemetery somewhere near Salem, Oregon.

False clues in some writings delayed things. We were in fact looking for Waldo Hills -not Walde, and Macleay (pronounced mc lay'), not Macleary. We made inquiries of morticians, including one who had worked around Salem for fifty years, without success.

Finally, today, we were able to make a trip to Salem. The day has been so full of surprises, that I hardly know where to begin. So I shall start at the beginning and trust you will work through this narrative to find the high points.

Tomorrow Betty Jean and I must be with Bob in Eugene, so we left home around noon, on a nice fall day, and drove to Salem. We first tried the Marion County Courthouse, and drew many blanks. But we persisted each time until the person queried would at the least, direct us to someone else. Many offices and elevator rides later, and a second trip back to an office we had already tried, turned up some one who could help. He knew the road it was on, told us how to get there, and told us if we crossed a railroad track at the edge of Macleay, we had missed it.

Actually, we found it before the railroad track, but had to drive into Macleay to find a wide spot to turn around and come back to the cemetery gate.

By the time we entered the cemetery, it was late in the afternoon, but sunny, which both helped and hindered. It made reading some markers easier, and others more difficult.

The cemetery is reasonably well tended, and the two of us determined a search pattern and started looking. Many of the stones were unreadable. Many had disappeared from their bases. No Walden was to be found!

But wonder of wonders! There was a stone for John Lemmon, 1800-1869! Next to his stone was one for "Jane B. Lemmon, Wife of John Lemmon, Died Feb 1, 1875, aged 65 years, 10 mo." Next to her stone, Philemon, Son of J and J B Lemmon, died Aug 23, 1855, age 8 years, 2 mo, 6 days. Later trips back there may alter my reading of Philemons, but it is basically correct. Nothing in my reading had prepared me for the discovery that Sarah Jane's parents and brother were buried there!

These stones became even more important later in the day, as you shall see.

Betty and I covered every foot of that cemetery, but no Walden name appeared. How could it be that our stone by stone search had turned up Lemmons, but no Waldens?

At Betty's suggestion, we went back the short distance to the Macleay General Store. A young man was helpful--very knowledgeable of local history--and from him discovered that Sarah Jane had served on the Board of Trustees for the Macleay Primitive Baptist Church. Sound familiar? Further conversation established the fact that the church was long gone, and had had a checkered history, changing denominations sometimes monthly. It even had served the Dunkards.

The young man was of little help on the cemetery part, but he sent us to pay dirt. No--he sent us to a starting point of some long, hard work. Before this is done with, I hope you will be able to make a trip to Macleay, because you are so much more involved and experienced in searching than I am.

Anyway, next door to the General Store is a nice restaurant. The young man took us there and introduced us to Danny Miller, and we talked about Macleay history. Eventually his brother Jerry Miller came in, and we learned that he has the same addiction as we, though his costs much more money, I'm sure. He was the one who told me genealogy is a disease. It must be. He said he spends hours and hours and hours on Macleay history, then throws his hands in the air and says to heck with it all.

He is so involved with Macleay history, Waldo Hills history, The Walden Addition history, and the Stipp Cemetery history, it is unbelievable.

He has in transcript form, eventually to be published (we are on the list of subscribers) a complete history of the Stipp Cemetery. I shouldn't say complete. As he said, research is never done. When he feels the transcript is in its best possible form, he will publish it.

Now--hold onto your chair. From the transcript, Jerry informed us there is one and only one Walden buried in the cemetery. There is no marker, because the early wooden ones have all rotted away. But he is buried between the Lemmon markers and Ashby markers. His name is Ebenezer Walden, born in 1796 in Kentucky, and died May, 1864.

Let me adjust that previous paragraph. Martha J. Walden Allen, who was sister to Nathan, is buried there, but she is in the Allen plot. Sometime we will locate her marker, but we didn't become aware of her burial there until too late to go back to the cemetery.

Jerry hopes to find us pictures of the original Walden home. It no longer exists. Neither does a stone storage shed on the Walden property which was used as a community building where the local people got together to grind

coffee.

Jerry also told us there was a great connection between Macleay and Weston and not just for the Waldens. As the land around Macleay was taken up, the sons of Macleay families went to Weston for more room.

Jerry says the Marion County Historical Society is very active, has a museum in Salem with much material on the Macleay and Waldo hills area, and can't understand why they didn't respond to your inquiries. Some day Betty and I will go back to Salem and try to spend some time in that museum.

I intend to write to Jerry Miller very soon, to reinforce our meeting and keep up that contact. You may want to write to him with specific questions about the area.

Macleay is just a wide spot in the road, and several miles out in the country from Salem, but their commitment to the area, by Danny and Jerry, that is, is obvious. Their revival of the old country store, and the beautiful large restaurant they built next to it, is to be admired, and I would bet real money that those places do not make it on their own. But like Jerry said, it is a disease!

Well, Norman, I hope you will find this material of some use, now and in the future.

P.S. Betty says I should add this story told to us by Jerry.

In a recent grave opening, the digger found a body where none should have been.

Around 1900, Indians sometimes sneaked into the cemetery at night to bury their dead, and the body in question was, in fact, an Indian woman. She was remarkably well preserved as a result of the following: She was in a fetal position, had been well wrapped in a wool blanket, and had copper coins stuffed in her mouth. Her skull had turned green and her skin and bones were all intact. Jerry questioned the undertaker about the stage of preservation, who revealed all of the above facts, and added that she probably had died of alcoholism, which might also have helped with the preservation!

What to do with her was solved by digging the grave deeper than usual, reburying her, and filling the hole back to the correct depth for a modern burial.

Oct 13, 1987

Dear Norman and Kae--

Darn you Norman Walden! I thought I could get slightly involved in all this Walden stuff. But as a man told me this week, geneology is a disease! Right now I have an all consuming fever. Along with everything else, a diary has turned up, written by John Walden, and started July 14, 1901. I may have it long enough to transcribe it. It will be many, many hours of typing, but when I am finished, I will send you a copy. So that must be where my attention is focused indefinitely.

However, the diary came to light after Betty and I made the momentous trip which will be described in the next few pages. I write them as a letter to you, but also as a narrative which you might want to add to your collection.

P.S. - Though the marker for John Lemmon photographed OK., the markers for Jane B + Child showed no contrast. Betty & I rubbed away moss and felt with our fingers to get their information.

A journal of accounts for the J.F.Walden Hardware store in Montague, Montana, exists for the year 1922. Most of the purchase entries ended in August, though payment entries continued up into December.

Beginning August 9, the contents of the store were sent to Claude and Roy in Chester in a variety of ways. By the end of August it may have all been gone from Montague.

In the next several pages, all of the accounts that existed between January 1, 1922 and August 15, 1922 are listed. These are all charge accounts, and entries of the individual items purchased exist. However, if the information would be of value to anyone, it could be reproduced. At the present time, I see no reason to do that.

In the journal, at the beginning of each alphabetical section, names were listed in the same order I have used. On each account, the name also appeared. I have included all information available after carefully comparing each alpha listing with the account listing.

In September, 1987, Clita L. Haight, oldest daughter of John Franklin Walden was questioned about her memories of Montague, Montana, where her father owned a hardware store for some years.

Montague obviously was a thriving community at one time. One only has to look at the list of accounts at the hardware store. The Montague Commercial Club, Montague State Bank, and the Montague Realty Co. are some examples of the services available.

In this present year, 1987, Montague no longer shows on maps of Montana. In 1950 it had a census of 25.

It was located on the CMS&P Railroad (Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Peoria). It was about 50 miles ENE of Great Falls, about 16 miles ESE of Fort Benton, and near the communities of Shonkin and Geraldine.

Interview:

Where did you first tie in with the Chapins? Was that in Montague? Is that where Mary Chapin came from?

Yes.

In some of your dad's materials there are two Chapins there in Montague that had accounts at the store. But they are only by initial and it seems to me one was L.H. and I don't remember the other one.

Leonard. Leonard Chapin was a farmer. He had another brother that I don't remember his name.

H.A.?

I've got to think what we called him. But Leonard was a farmer type. He was a big fellow--like Mary. But this other brother--Clarence, I think--but that doesn't make sense. Anyway, he was a business man in the east someplace. But he visited out there.

How long was that store open in Montague? I know it closed in 1922.

well, let's see. The hardware store (pause)

Norman wants to go find Montague. He can't find it on the map. I know that in 1950 it still had 25 people.

Yes, I was going to say, there were at least that many people there then. If I were Norman, I would go to Fort Benton. It was the county seat of the county we were in.

Do you know when or approximately when the store was started, or opened?

Well, I could figure that out if I could remember when I went to grade school. That was when I was a fifth grader, I think. I had lived in Montana or Canada for all my grade school years. How old would I be as a fifth grader?

About eleven.

Yeah. Well, we were there when the first world war started. The war started in 1914.

You were there when it ended, or when it started?

Both. I would think it started about 1912. Something like that. Wouldn't they still have Montague records at Fort Benton? We went to the county court house at Fort Benton when we were hunting Bob's birth certificate. When we gave them the name and all and they gave us the school years when we were there.

That may be with Bob's stuff then. (Betty- Bob was born in Montana³)

No, he was born in Eugene before we left Oregon. He was just a little boy up there in Canada.

Did the store close because of hard times, or?

Things just slowed down. He tried to sell out. There just wasn't anyone to sell to. The farmer's crops all failed and they lost money. And we lost the little bank, and dad lost money in that. And then we finally decided to move- I was at the place where I had to get into high school someplace. There wasn't any high school at Montague. They extended the classes and the teachers tried to teach it. And they decided to go back to Eugene where the schools were good. That's what mother wanted to do. Dad thought it was a good idea too. Mother went on ahead then, and rented a house in Eugene. And the merchandise-- they shipped it all up to the Chester store. She rented a house on Columbia St.

Yes, I have the records of that.

It went to Claude and Roy.

There was absolutely no money there.

Was it a railroad town?

Well, it was a railroad stop. Because dad had a job in the winter time of watering the trains. The trains all stopped there for rewatering. I can remember that the trains would whistle, way down the track. Dad would hear the whistle, and it would whistle three times--I don't know what the signal was--there was a certain signal that I want water. And dad had to get up and dress and go down there, in the bitter cold. I can remember that. He did that for several years we were there, to try to make a little better living for us. But he didn't go out and do any other jobs. And that's where the Janzen family came in. They were farmers.

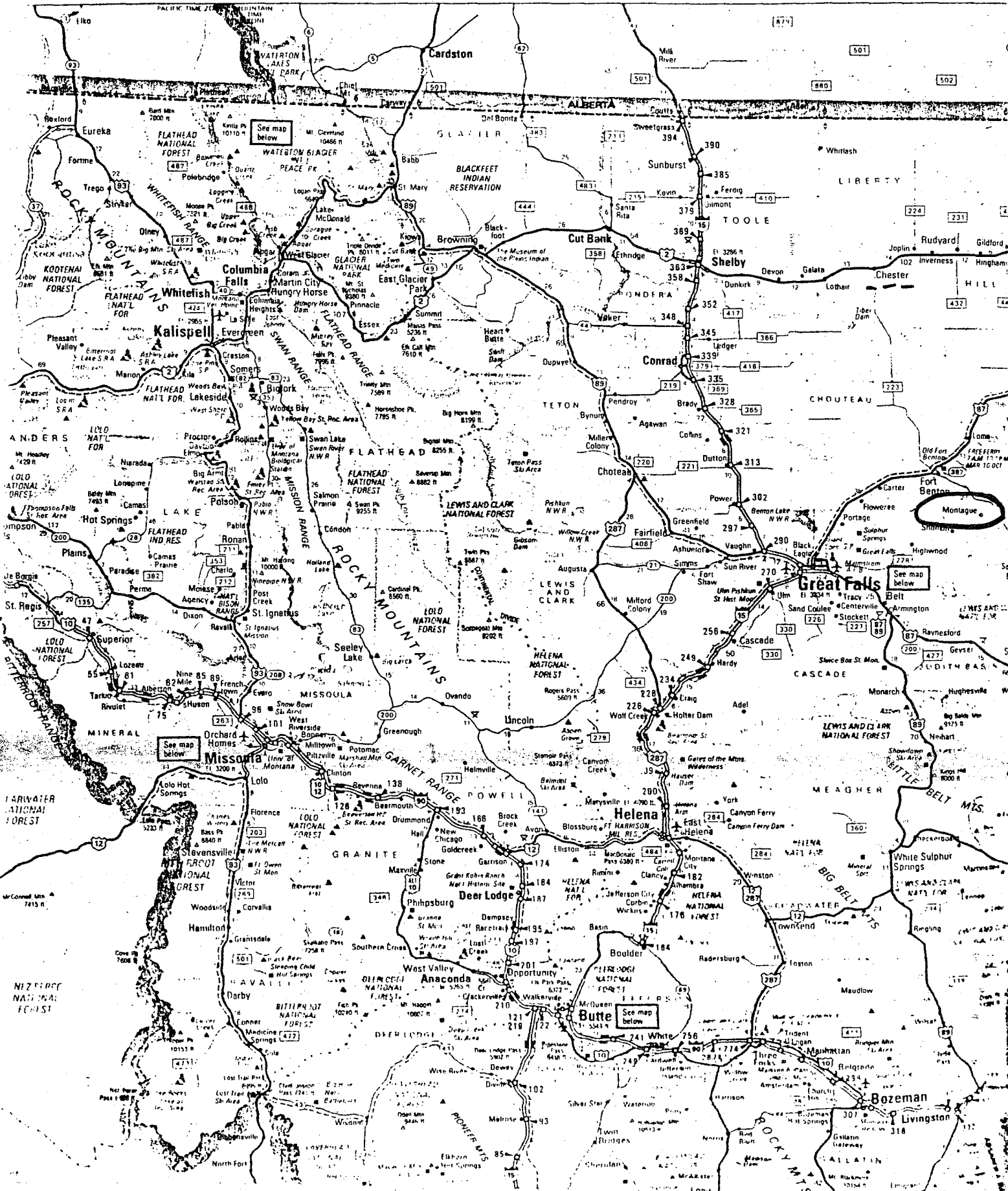
Yes, I've run across their names too.

Are YOU related to someone who was involved in building the Military Road from Ft. Walla Walla, Washinton Territory to Ft. Benton, Nebraska Territory during the years 1858-1863?

On July 4, 1989, as part of the centennial celebration of the State of Montana, dedication ceremonies are being held in St. Regis, Montana, honoring John Mullan, roadbuilder.

As part of the activities the Mineral County Museum and Historical Society is trying to locate descendants of the crews of 1858-1863. This includes workmen, military, cooks and anyone else who may have been involved however slightly.

The historical society at this time has the names of over 200 persons but we are sure there were three or four times that many that were involved.
